
DIGGING INTO DIGITIZATION: EXCHANGING DIGITAL RESOURCES IN ARCHAEOLOGY



Friday, 7th November 2025, Hegelstr. 59, Room 00-309, Mainz Organisors: Kathrin Gabler and Catherine Teitz As archaeology enters the 21st century, the emergence of digital tools and methods has enabled deeper engagement with these centers of human history. While some projects were early adopters of new technologies, others have recently developed their overall digital systems. As ever-more sites implement digital solutions, both in the field and the archive, it is essential to exchange best practices across disciplines and, through collaboration, to discover new and unexpected solutions to pressing problems.

The aim of this hybrid workshop is to facilitate an interdisciplinary exchange between archaeological projects that use a variety of digital methods and tools, so that researchers across different fields can learn from others' experiences. The workshop showcases a variety of approaches to digital documentation, from recording excavations in the trench to the retrofit of archival data into new systems. New digital tools can enable not only the work of specialists with their datasets, but also better integrate that information into the broader analysis, and databases, of the site.
